

## What is Left of European democracy?

## 25-26 November 2011

RECON's final conference discusses key findings from the 5-year long project (2007-2011), which has focused on the conditions for democracy in Europe. The greater, more overarching implications that this collective research effort has generated will be discerned. But due attention will also be paid to the most pressing issue currently facing the EU. The first part of the conference is thus devoted to discerning the main lessons from the financial crisis and the likely implications for the EU.
